The conference will also feature three distinguished speakers who will explore unconventional clinical pathways to impact health equity.

Selected Presentations:

FutureCare Directions: Empowering Patient Choices at Anderson Free Clinic

Megan McDonald - Medical University of South Carolina

This project addresses a critical gap in advanced care planning (ACP) for underserved populations. It implements a patient-centered approach to ACP at a free clinic, ensuring patients' voices are heard and healthcare wishes respected. The initiative includes a user-friendly ACP handout, staff training, and a standardized documentation system. By integrating ACP into routine care, it empowers underserved patients to make informed decisions about their care.

The Life Histories Project

Avery Ofoje - Medical University of South Carolina

Building on a successful model from Harvard Medical School, this initiative collects and elevates stories from patients facing systemic healthcare barriers. The project focuses on marginalized patients navigating challenges related to race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, and socioeconomic status. By sharing these narratives with care teams, the project helps redirect attention to patients' lived experiences and values in treatment planning.

Impact of Medicaid Expansion and Work Requirements in South Dakota

University of South Dakota Sanford School of Medicine Aequitas Health Chapter

This timely analysis examines how recent policy changes affect healthcare access in South Dakota, particularly for Native American communities and rural populations. The project evaluates Medicaid enrollment trends from 2020-2023, exploring the effects of COVID-19 policy changes, the state's 2023 Medicaid expansion, and newly implemented work requirements. The research provides valuable insights into how policy decisions impact vulnerable populations' access to care.
